INCREDIBLE KINDS

Incredible Kinds provides play and support to children with additional needs and their families, we utilise a fabulous outdoor space in an adventure playground at The Vench in Lockleaze and get the children involved in many activities including signposting families to other services and charities to support them as well as giving advice about things like how to navigate the process of EHCPs. A regular weekly meal is provided for the children, and when funding allows, can provide family meals. These meals have been very impactful in helping the families during the cost-of-living crisis and the need and benefit of them has spoken for itself in our huge demand for places on our booking system.

"I made a special visit to one of the weekly play Friday session events, upon arrival I met with the founder of the charity Jennie Prewett and was introduced to the service manager Jeanna, but it wasn't long before the children at the session took over and tried to steal me away, to proudly show off their crafting creations. With cheeks full of biscuits and sticky glitter hands, they wanted to proudly show off their crafting skills.

Several of the parents were eager to share their journey, their story of the challenges and joys involved in parenting and caring for a child or young person with additional needs. Ispent much time listening to them share their battle to achieve what any parent would want for their child".

Sharon walked into our happy albeit chaotic Friday evening and caused quite a stir because our kids always get excited about a new guest. One teenager was very keen to bypass the shaking of hands and lunge in for a bear sized hug and amongst a plethora of demands to show her their play doh and paintings or bowls of ice cream, she was snatched up immediately and claimed as one of our own.

The gift of a listening ear is free and immeasurable in its value to our families, so with that we would like to say a heart felt thank you to Sharon for visiting us at our play session and rope that she will visit us whenever she likes again.

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LAWRENCE WESTON SCRAPSTORE

Play sessions are on offer weekly in various locations around Bristol, this also includes the Easter and Summer holidays. The High Sheriff fund supports the Children's Scrapstore to deliver free Play Sessions in the short holidays, which helps us to maintain a consistent approach for children and young people in the area. The continuous provision throughout the year embeds us positively into communities and in turn these young lives. As playworkers, who are not teachers, parents, or carers, we are fun, safe, consistent adults regularly present in children's lives, and are humbled by what the children want to share with us. The sessions create a safe and secure space for children to play outside and in nature; we see friendships being formed, the art of conversation being practised and families playing together. Our van is packed full of inspiration for creative and imaginative play and in the holidays, we are fortunate enough to be able to provide a free lunch, none of which would be possible without the support from funders.



LAWRENCE WESTON OUT OF SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Lawrence Weston Out of School Activities provides activities such as arts and crafts – making castles, Diwali rockets, painting portraits, hanging ghosts, pumpkin picture, making crowns and party hats, valentine cards, making cardborads games, clay mugs, painting baubles. Parties - Royal tea party, Valentine party, Halloween party, Scavenger hunts, wellie walks, leaf rubbing, visits to parks. Day Trips - Museums, Kings Weston House, Cinema. Sports Challenges.



PLAY WOODEN CIC

Play Wooden CIC provides free play activities and wooden-making workshops for children and young people. The workshop supports creativity, dexterity skills, resilience and bond with peers and parent this initiates the young people's entrepreneurship journey through play – that encourages more independent play with those who are often shy.

HARTCLIFFE CLUB FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

Hartcliffe Club for Young People delivers a range of activities and opportunities for young people from art workshops to axe throwing. Organise fancy dress for Halloween, trips to local attractions, sports days, cooking competition, nature walks, bike rides, train journey, Urban orienteering around Bristol landmarks, visiting parks/ open spaces in Bristol.



RIVERSIDE YOUTH PROJECT

Riverside Youth Project are based centrally in Easton and St Pauls areas they work with challenging mix of young people who are sadly surrounded by poverty and crime, the club becomes a safe haven for them. A positive sports and health programme is used to providing Residential camps – where camp weekend at the end of each week, activities around climbing wall, snooker, pool, table tennis, table football, football, tag rugby and boxing taster sessions. Breakfast and packed lunch are provided the residential weekend form parts of a reward for the most needy young people that gives them living away from home experience which turns out very successful and have given them the confidence to join the youth section of the club.

The Bristol Youth and Community Action (BYCA) programme supports groups providing physical and creative activities for 8-12-year-olds during school holidays in the communities with greatest need. It is chaired by the High Sheriff of Bristol and funded from the High Sheriff's Fund. with money raised through an event and an appeal. BYCA is managed by Quartet Community Foundation (registered charity number: 1080418) and supports young people aged 8-12 years by funding a wide range of activities that offer positive experiences and reduce the risk of involvement in anti-social behaviour. BYCA also provides funding to small projects identified by Police Community Support Officers that would benefit children and young people in their area.
